


Financial Update



It's Flu Season! Get Your Flu Shot – At School

Fall marks the start of flu season. Flu vaccines are available at the Nationwide Children's School-Based Health Center at Shelby High School for students and their siblings, ages 0 to 21.

The flu vaccine is recommended for anyone ages 6 months and older. In addition to the flu vaccine, students and their siblings can get other needed immunizations and sick care at the School-Based Health Center.

Open Monday through Thursday from 8 a.m. - 4:30 p.m., the center offers the following services:

- Regular checkups (well visits)
- Shots (immunizations)
- Blood work
- Sports physicals
- Help when your child is sick
- Treatment for asthma or diabetes
- Help with work permit physicals
- Treatment for anxiety, depression and ADHD

Please note that the school-based health center is not meant to replace a student's existing pediatrician but to provide help to children who do not have a doctor. Consent from the student's parent/guardian is needed for a child to be seen. To schedule an appointment, call 567-307-6009.

Parents and guardians are always welcome to be at the visit, but it is not required. School-based health center staff will follow up with the parent/guardian after the visit to explain what took place and any needed follow up.

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Home + School = Recipe for Success

The Early Learning Center, which includes grades PreK-2, rolled out its first of many home and school connection events this year with a Parent Breakfast. Parents were invited to have breakfast in the classroom with their young learners.

Following breakfast, students left their parents with their teacher for a rundown on what to expect this year. Teachers took the opportunity to share with parents how their child will be learning and growing throughout the school year. Parents were brought up to speed on the Science of Reading and how this movement is impacting phonics and reading instruction for our youngest learners. The "Leader in Me" curriculum was also explained and detailed how students are learning the 7 habits of highly effective people as a part of their character and social development. The highlights of mathematical thinking were also shared at each grade level.

During the Preschool Parent Breakfast, there were some special visitors for a Touch a Truck event. Our local police and fire departments were on hand to share their vehicles with our students for a hands-on learning experience.
