As we prepare for the next school year, the district is closely monitoring the governor's budget proposal and any potential changes to school funding. Gov. Mike DeWine recently outlined his plan, which includes continued implementation of the Fair School Funding Plan, additional support for school bus safety grants and expanded access to driver education in high schools. The proposal also emphasizes early literacy efforts and introduces the Ohio

See Program, which would provide eye exams and eyeglasses to kindergarten through third-grade students.

While the full impact of these measures on our district remains to be seen, we will continue evaluating our budget and planning responsibly to ensure we meet the needs of our students, staff and community. As more details become available, we will provide updates on how any funding adjustments may affect our schools. Our priority remains maintaining a strong financial foundation while supporting student success.
